

Dr. Will ThomasSt. Barnabas Episcopal Church

Will, where are you from originally?

I was born outside of Nashville in Murfreesboro, Tennessee. While pursuing

my Bachelor's and Master's Degrees, I lived and worked in the Knoxville, Tennessee area. During my Doctoral work, I lived in Tucson, Arizona.

What are your earliest musical memories?

My earliest musical memories are of my grandmother teaching me piano on her upright Gulbransen piano, which I now own.

Where did you study organ?

I graduated high school from Dekalb County High in Smithville, Tennessee. During my senior year, I studied organ at Christ Church Episcopal Cathedral, in Nashville with Dr. Michael Velting. I earned the Bachelor of Sacred Music from Carson-Newman University in Jefferson City Tennessee where I studied organ with Dr. J. Ryan Garber. I earned the Master of Music Degree in Organ Performance from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville as a student of Professor John Brock. Additionally, I completed the DMA Degree in Organ Performance from the University of Arizona where I studied with Dr. Pamela Decker.

What brought you to Wilmington and how are you enjoying it?

The full-time position of Parish Administrator and Director of Music at St. Barnabas' Episcopal Church brought me to Wilmington. I love the area, especially being so close to New York City and only an hour and a half from the beach.

Can you give us an overview of your position at St. Barnabas?

As the Parish Administrator at St. Barnabas, I serve as an executive assistant to the Rector and oversee all communications in the parish. Some of the parish communications include preparing weekly bulletins, producing a monthly newsletter, managing the church's website as well as the social media accounts, and scheduling facility usage. As the Director of Music, I select the music and play the organ for both the Sunday 10:00 a.m. service and additional services throughout the year. I also direct the adult Parish Choir and will direct children and handbell choirs in the fall.

Tell us about the new organ at St. Barnabas.

The new Cornell-Zimmer electronic organ at St. Barnabas, on which I played the dedication recital this past November, demonstrates the incredible capability of digital organs imitating actual pipe sounds. In addition to plenty of general, divisional, and toe pistons, St. Barnabas's organ stop list includes resonant reeds, clear flutes, beautiful strings, and powerful foundation stops. On Sunday March 20th at 4:00 p.m., St. Barnabas welcomes organist Chad Levitt to the console. Mr. Levitt will perform a fantastic program that includes compositions from the French Classical, Baroque, Romantic, and Modern eras.

How has the pandemic era been for you?

Fortunately, during the pandemic, I have been healthy and have not suffered financially. I have been able to continue teaching private students via zoom. Moving forward, I hope that all AGO concerts are live-streamed.

Any current repertoire or upcoming projects you're working on?

In October, I will perform an alumni recital at my undergraduate institution Carson-Newman University in Jefferson City Tennessee. My program will include both previously-learned and newly-learned repertoire. Soon, I will begin learning J.S. Bach's *Prelude and Fugue in G Major*, BWV 550 and an organ sonata composed by my undergraduate organ professor, Dr. J. Ryan Garber. Additional future projects include my own edition of Mendelssohn's *Six Organs Sonatas* that reflect components of my dissertation entitled, *Rhythmic Freedom in Mendelssohn's Six Organ Sonatas*.

The AGO has named this the "Year of the Young Organist" - as a young organist yourself, do you have any hopes or expectations? I hope that AGO chapters will include more opportunities and activities for high school students. The more positive experiences people have during this time can have long-lasting effects.

Any hobbies/interests outside of musical activities? When my schedule permits, I enjoy movies and Broadway plays.

The Uncomfortable Reality of Donating Music

I recently learned that a former colleague of mine in Ohio is suffering from Alzheimer's. In response to my offer to help, his wife asked if I had any ideas about what she could do with all his music. Interestingly, he and his family were/are in the funeral business, and no strangers to planning "final arrangements." It seems, however, that his music collection had never been discussed.

I did a bit of pondering and a bit of research to answer her question, and that process made me realize that we all will likely find ourselves in this situation someday. I know that I would do myself and my family a huge favor if I would make arrangements for my music collection. In the spirit of making things a bit easier for my survivors, I offer the following possibilities.

Family Members

It's a good idea to talk with your family members about where you'd like all of your

possessions to eventually end up! Before you get rid of the music, check with family members to see if anyone wants any of it.

Maybe one of your children remembers a certain piece that you played and would love to have one of their kids learn. Maybe a grandchild would consider it cool to have some of your music. Maybe a cover of some sheet music could be framed as a memento or maybe the first page of a composition could be an interesting focal point in a collection of photos. Suggest to them that sheet music pages could be used in crafts – as wrapping paper, origami or drawer lining. Let them know that, if nobody wants it, it is okay to throw it away!

Students

Invite keyboardists, choristers, or classroom students to look through your collection and take what they want.
